How is the AP World History Exam structured? The AP World History exam is three hours and 15 minutes and consists of two sections, each containing part A and part B. Here is a basic overview of these sections before entering the nitty-gritty below: Section 1, Part A: Multiple choice Section 1, Part B: Short answers Section 2, Part A: Document-based question (DBQ) Section 2, Part B: It should be noted that the AP World History exam has undergone some major changes for the 2019-20 school year. Instead of covering thousands of years of history and human development, it will now cover only the 1200s to the present; As a result, the exam was renamed AP World History: Modern (an AP World History: Ancient course and exam are in the works). Section 1 Format Section 1 on the AP World History exam lasts a total of 95 minutes and consists of two parts: Part A: Multiple choice Part B: Short answer This graphwhat you can expect for each part of section 1 on the world history exam: section 1 type of question time% of the score Part A Multiple choice 55 min 55 40% Part B Short answer 40 min 3 (for the third, choose 1 of 2 requests) 20% TOTAL — 95 min 58 60% Part One lasts 55 minutes and counts for 40% of the total AP World History score. Every question on this side comes with four possible response choices (called A-D.) Since there are no sanctions for wrong answers, it is in your interest to fill an answer for each question. Most multi-choice questions come in sets of three to four questions and require analysis of primary and secondary sources, as well as data in the form of charts, maps, etc. Part B lasts 40 minutes and counts for 20% of the final AP score. For this section, you need to write three short answers (get four requests in total, but you choose one of the two tips to write about for your third essay.) You will have different sources, or stimuli, for every short message of response: Short answer 1: Includes a secondary source Short answer 2: Includes a primary source Short 3/4 Response (choose a prompt.) No stimulus for both options; Prompt 3 focuses on the 1200-1750s, while the prompt 4 focuses on the 1750-2001 Section 2 Format Section 2 on the AP World History test lasts 100 minutes and, like Section 1, consists of two parts: Part A: Document-based question (DBQ) Part B: Here is a brief overview of the size of Section 2 of the world's history exam: Section 2 Question Time % of applications Part A Question based on documents 60 minutes (including a 15-minute reading period) 1 25% Part B Long Essay 40 mins 1 (choice 1 of 3 requests) 15% TOTAL — 100 min 2 40% Part A in Section 2 lasts an hour and counts for 25% of the total score. For document-based application, or DBQ, you will get seven documents that offer different views on a given historical development. It is necessary to write awith a subject supported by this historical evidence. Part B, which is the long essay, lasts only 40 minutes and counts for 15%Your AP score. This part of the test requires you to write a complete essay in response to one of the three suggestions (you choose which one you want to write about). Unlike the DBQ, you have no direct historical evidence to use in your essay; you have to come with it yourself to support your argument. Here are the three types of requests to choose from for the long essay: Prompt 1: Focuses on the years 1200-1750 Prompt 2: Focuses on the years 1450-1900 Prompt 3: Focuses on the years 1750-2001 Unfortunately, Stonehenge will not be tested on the exam. But, hey, at least your picture did it in this article! What kind of content is covered in the history of the AP world? The contents of the AP World History exam are divided into six overwriting themes and nine distinct units. Knowing these categorizations can help you get a better sense of what types of historical trends you will be asked to examine (this is particularly useful when writing free response essays!). Units are roughly divided into overlapping periods of time. Below, we present current themes and units, as described in the history of the world AP 2019-20: Modern course and examination description. Sample AP World History Test Questions We try through examples of each of the four types of questions you will see on the AP World History exam. All sample questions come from 2019-20 World History Course and Exam Description. Example of multi-short questions Most multiple choice questions come in sets of three to four questions asking you to answer a particular source, or stimuli, such as a primary source, a secondary source, or data in the form of a map, chart or table. In this sample question, you're doingread and interpret two separate passages. You need to have a background knowledge of economic trends at the end of the 20th century to be able to select the correct answer here (which is the C response choice). Example of short answer questions This short answer is accompanied by a secondary source. In each short answer question on the test, each part (A-C) should only require a one-to-two-sentence response. You will then get 1 point per correct answer (so the maximum you can earn on a short answer question is 3 points). Here's how you could earn full credit for this question, for official scoring guidelines. (A) Sample Answers The topic of Hakuseki was influenced by Confucianism. The argument of Hakuseki that the sovereign is Heaven for subjects and the father is Heaven for the child was influenced by the Confucian beliefs. The argument of Hakuseki that only the emperor should serve the Lord of Heaven reflects the beliefs of Confucianism. (B) Sample Answers An important difference is that most Christian missionaries and Muslim Sufis traveled around the world and spread their religion without being banished by other governments. An important difference between the circumstances of the religious encounter in the eighteenth century Japan and other religious encounters in this period more frequently led to the development of syncretic belief systems such as Vodou or Santería than the definitive prohibition of preaching a religion. An important difference between the Tokugawa shogunate that prohibits preaching Christianity and most other religious interactions in the period 1450–1750 is that some governments, such as the Mughal Empire under Akbar, encouraged religious tolerance and interaction. (C) Sample responses India Mughal emperors and kingsof Kongo have attempted to limit European traders to certain cities and trading places. China's Ming and Qing emperors confined Portuguese merchants to Macau and andLegal restrictions on conversion to Christianity. Although the Safavid Empire allowed European merchants to settle in some cities and also serve as court advisers, preaching Christianity was strictly forbidden. This type of next question requires you to dig deep in history, preferably with a fresh magnifying glass. Example of document-based questions You will receive seven documents with your DBQ (not shown in the sample above), and you will need to use at least six of these as proof in your answer. The DBQ is up to 7 points. Here's what you would do to earn full credit for this DBQ sample, for the scoring guidelines. How to Earn Full Credit Sample Response Thesis/Claim(0-1 points) The answer must provide a historically disconnectible thesis or state that it establishes a position to the extent that the experience of the First World War has changed the relations between Europeans and colonized peoples; thesis or claim must provide some indication of the reason to make such claim Or by establishing categories of the topic "The experience of the First World War has greatly changed the relationship between Europeans and colonized peoples because the war has shown that European colonial troops need to fight their war. Contextualization (0-1 points) It must accurately describe a context relevant to World War I or the interactions between Europeans and colonized peoples before or during World War I (XIX and early 20 years) " Both Britain and France had long recruited local troops in their colonies and used them to suppress revolts and expand their colonial empires. When the World War I started, it was quite clear that it would be a "total war" that required all the resources that countries could make, so it was a previous conclusion that these colonial armies will beboth on the European fronts and in Asia and Africa". Test (0-3 points) 2 points: Supports a topic in response to the prompt using content accuratelyat least six documents; the six documents should not be used in support of a single subject, but can be used through the subargos or to address the against arguments 1 point: It must use at least one specific piece of historical evidence relevant to a topic about the extent to which there have been changes in the relationships between European and colonized people who have caused from the First World War (Document 1): "The letter of John Chilembwe at the Nyassaland Times shows that the need for Europeans to recruit has changed the relationship between colonizers and colonial peoples because the English in Nyasaland now have to appeal to the sense of duty and patriotism of Africans. But after seeing how Europeans treated their colonial subjects in peacetime, Chilembwe is not buying it." "Many colonized people had hoped that after the end of the war they would be rewarded by their service giving them fuller citizenship rights, if not absolute independence. But the peace treaties have left untouched British and French empires and have actually expanded them through the Mandate system." Analysis and reasoning (0-2 points) 1 point: it must explain how or why, rather than simply identify, the point of view of the document, the purpose, the historical situation, or the public is relevant to a topic that addresses the prompt for each of the three documents that were presented 1 point: It must demonstrate a complex understanding, as explaining the nuance of a problem by analyzing more variables, or explaining relevant and intuitive connections within and through periods (Document 1): "As an ordained minister, John Chilembwe is probably against wars in general, but in the case of the First World War it is particularly against the idea of Africans serving because it can see that there is no longer scope for war than European political and economic gain. Example of long essays questions For the long essay, you will have three possible tips to choose from. This question is an example of a Option 2 prompt with a focus on the 1450-1900 years—in this case, the 19th century. You can earn up to 6 points for your essay. Here's what you would do to earn full credit for this sample, for official scoring guidelines: How to Earn Full Credit Sample Response Thesis/Claim(0-1 points) The answer must provide a historically worthy thesis or claim the extent to which reform movements have succeeded in leading to political or social changes in industrial society in the 19th century. The thesis or claim must provide some indication of reasoning to make such claim Or by establishing analytical categories of the topic "The 19th century reform movements have had some success in bringing to political changes in industrial societies because more people have received the right to vote." Contextualization (0-1 points) It must accurately describe a context relevant to reform movements or industrial society in the 19th century "Invasions in agriculture in Europe have allowed an increase in mechanization in the production of goods. This industrial revolution has spread in Europe and North America and has led to challenges for traditional social and political structures." Tests(0-2 points) It must use at least two examples of specific historical evidence to support a topic on how reform movements led to political or social changes in industrial society in the 19th century "During the 19th century, most governments of industrial societies successfully resisted to adopt most of the needs of political and social reform movements. For example, the British Government has adopted very few of the demands for the annual elections for the Parliament, and the minimum wage and working day laws of eight hours were issued only in20th century in most industrialized states." Analysis and reasoning (0-2 points) It must demonstrate a complex understanding, as explaining the nuance of a problem by analyzing more variables, or explaining relevant and intuitive connections within and through N/A periods How is the AP World History Exam Scored? Now that you have seen what questions resemble the AP World History Test, let's quickly understand how the exam is marked. Like all other AP tests, you will get a final score scaled for AP World History on a scale of 1-5. This is a cumulative score that combines your raw scores from each of the four parts of the test (Multiple Choice, Short Answer, DBQ and Long Essay). Continue reading to see how every part of the AP world history test is marked. Multiple choice The raw score for the multiple-choice section is simple: you earn 1 point for each multiple choice question responds correctly. Since there are 55 questions, the maximum number of points you can earn here is 55. Remember that this part counts for 40% of the total score. No point is removed for wrong answers, so make sure to fill each answer bubble! Brief Answer Each short answer question is worth 3 points, one for each task (called A-C) you must complete. Since there are three short answer questions, this means you can earn a total of 9 crude points for all answers. The short-range portion counts for 20% of the final AP score.
